

Michael R. Baumgaertner, M.D., F.A.C.S. is an orthopaedic traumatologist who is Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery & Rehabilitation at Yale School of Medicine in New Haven, Connecticut. He serves as Chief of the Orthopaedic Trauma Service at Yale-New Haven Hospital. Dr. Baumgaertner was raised in St. Paul, Minnesota, but most all of his medical education occurred in California. After graduating from Stanford University with a degree in Art History, he received his M.D. from the University of California (San Diego). He did his orthopaedic surgery residency at the University of California (San Francisco). After a one year fellowship in plastic and reconstructive surgery, at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center in Worcester, Massachusetts, he joined the Faculty of the Yale School of Medicine.

During his career at Yale, Dr. Baumgaertner has been very active in the Orthopaedic Trauma Association, and the AO/ASIF, having served and chaired several committees in these organizations. He has taken sabbaticals from Yale to learn and teach in Switzerland, Scotland, New Zealand, and traveled extensively to lecture. He is known primarily for his clinical research on proximal femur fractures, but has authored numerous original articles and chapters in orthopaedic textbooks. He co-edited the most recent AAOS Orthopaedic Knowledge Update: Trauma. Dr. Baumgaertner is married and the father of four children. If he had more free time, he would spend it on his mountain bike in the wooded, rolling hills of Connecticut.
